



## Suggested Packing Checklist

- Italian/English pocket dictionary
- Dressy outfits** (this can be as casual as a nice pair of jeans and a collared shirt. You will need them for a variety of occasions such as church services, outreaches, and nights out. Italians tend to dress nicer when “going out” you will fit in much better if you have some dressier outfits).
- Alarm clock** (at least one per room)
- Laundry bag** (for dirty clothes)
- Plain black t-shirt, plain long sleeve black shirt for mimes (men & women)
- Plain white t-shirt, plain white long sleeve shirt (men only)
- Warm clothes** (especially if coming during Spring semester)
- Winter coat, hat, scarf**, mittens/gloves
- Socks
- Slippers

- Index cards (for studying)
- Water bottle** (e.g., Nalgene)
- Clothing for about 2 weeks

- Sneaker(s)** (lots of walking)

- Notebooks
- Pens/Pencils
- Folders
- ATM/credit card**
